	In a more volatile and stressed environment, the risks of credit positions turning south is rising. For insurers, this is a potential area of strategic concern across public and private assets, particularly given the risks of clustering if problems emerge. Insurers are also much more exposed today to private credit assets, with many market participants only having hazy memories of the full credit cycle. What might a workout look like today, what are the tools and resources needed, and is the experience / expertise there in sufficient scale?

Regulation, however, is also making equity investing more palatable for insurers, for example, the loosening of capital requirements for infrastructure equity in some jurisdictions, potentially providing valuable added capacity and returns. Is it worth insurers rethinking fundamental tenets of insurance investing?
